Bridging the Gap Between elected representatives and their constituents

The relation between elected representatives and constituents (voters) in a democratic society are of paramount importance.

Face-to-face interaction plays a crucial role in fostering a strong connection, promoting transparency, and bridging the gap between the two. One such platform that facilitates this essential interaction is the Open Court - an innovative approach to bringing citizens and elected representatives together.

Elected representative whose work is to make policies, and ensure that the policies and actions are responsive to the needs and aspirations of the people. For the elected representatives to work effectively it is essential that they actively engage with constituents. Pro active engagements help them understand the constituents needs and current conditions of the constituency. Lawmakers can also take on constituents' opinion on the bills or the policy that they aim to introduce in the council. This will help them gather support and once the bill becomes a law it gets greater trust & ownership from the citizens.

In a healthy democracy, the roles of both elected representatives and citizens are crucial. By working together, they can ensure effective governance, representation, and the advancement of the collective interests of the community.

It is widely accepted at national and international level that local authorities are responsible for delivering a broad range of services in relation to roads and traffic; planning; housing; economic and community development; environment; recreation and amenity services; fire services and for maintaining the register of electors. Moreover, because of its proximity to the people, the local governments are in a better position to ensure that government policies translate into services that will automatically meet the needs of the people.

Communication between the elected representative and their constituents play a key role in making the local government effective. In this regard, Shehri-Citizens for a Better Environment has organized an 'open court' (Khuli Katchery) on Saturday, 22nd July 2023 (11:00 am) at Mirpurkhas. The constituents will narrate their issues and set forth the problems which they face concurrently to their elected representatives.
